Letter from our **President**

Dear Members.

Recently while researching information through much of the FOLQ archives, I was struck by how much attention has been given and for how long a period of time to Lake Q's poor water quality. Interest in reporting, identifying, documenting, recommending and attempting solutions to



improve the lake's water quality is documented cutting across Federal and State agencies, Town Government, volunteer groups, engineering firms and private citizens. While this has been going on for well over 100 years, the lake has been very patient.

However, with the soon expected release to the DPW of a lake water quality condition report and improvement recommendation from a completed study by SOLitude Lake Management, we should have a strategy to consider. Different people than before but with similar authorities and responsibilities will need to come together to make a commitment to determine a way to reach the elusive goal of the past 100+ years, that is a safer, more recreationally diverse and aesthetically appealing lake.

FOLQ looks forward to representing you and being a contributing partner in the next water quality improvement discussions.

In 2024, Friends of Lake Quannapowitt saw a remarkable increase in the number of people actively volunteering to help with our efforts. We asked two of our newest volunteers, Rebecca Anderson (left in photo) and Rachel Moulton (right), why they started volunteering with FOLQ's work to remove invasive plants along the lakeshore.

Both volunteers say that part of their inspiration was being able to do something hands-on for this community.

For new Wakefield resident Rebecca, it was the chance to combine her hobbies with community involvement. "I recently moved to Wakefield and, as a retired person, I was looking for opportunities to use my skills to help the community," Rebecca says. "I love gardening, so it seemed like a perfect fit to help take care of the lake that is such a valuable asset for the town."

Brick Dedication Ceremony



You are invited to join the Friends of Lake Quannapowitt on **Sunday**, **June 8** at **2:00pm** for a Brick Dedication Ceremony recognizing the engraved bricks installed in 2024 and 2025 at the Col. Connelly Park Flagpole Plaza.

The brick dedication ceremony is held in appreciation of the brick donors and will include a reflection on the significance of the bricks and the inscriptions they bear.

Please note that seating will not be provided—guests are invited to bring a lawn chair for their comfort.

The ceremony will take place if there is minor wind or rain. In the event of severe weather, the ceremony will be held in Spring 2026. Notice will be posted on the FOLQ Instagram and Facebook pages and website.

Fish Line Receptacles

Since early 2024, FOLQ has been working on a program to install fishing line recycling receptacles around Lake Quannapowitt. The effort was spurred by the entanglements of a Great Horn Owl on New Year's Day, 2024, and a Common Loon later that winter, which led to public calls for better ways to keep our shores clean of discarded fishing line (also known as monofilament). With the support of the Department of Public Works and the Town Council, plus helpful input from the public, FOLQ will build and install receptacles this spring. Any fishing line, lures, bobbers, and hooks found around the lake can be placed in the receptacles. FOLQ will empty the bins
